

Migration and Female Transnational Professionals in Hong Kong 香港における越境するプロフェッショナル女性と移住

To date we know relatively little about the perspectives and experiences of female transnational elites. Our presentation looks at the mobility and life strategies, concerns and contexts, and sense of belonging of three broad types of transnational female professionals who arrived in Hong Kong between 1970s and 2010s. We will suggest how studies of expatriate women can pave the way for thinking beyond traditional models of assimilation in theorising and empirical investigation in the field of migration in global cities.

国境を越えるエリート女性の観点と経験については、今日まであまり知られていない。この講演では、1970年代から2010年代にかけて香港にやってきたプロフェッショナル女性を大きく3つのタイプに分け、移動の仕方、人生設計、心配事、それぞれの事情、所属意識について考察する。そして、移住女性研究が、グローバル都市における移住研究の理論化および実証調査の「伝統的な」同化モデルを越える思考を切り開くことを提案する。

Maggy is Professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Hong Kong. She has published widely on migration and human trafficking. Her publications include: *Trafficking and Global Crime Control* (Sage, 2011), *Human Trafficking* (Willan, 2007), and ‘Human Trafficking and Border Control in the Global South’ in Aas and Bosworth (eds), *The Borders of Punishment* (Oxford University Press, 2013). She is the Principal Investigator on a number of research projects, including ‘British and Asian lifestyle migrants’ (funded by the ESRC/Hong Kong Research Grants Council), ‘Female transnational professionals in Hong Kong’ (funded by the HK Central Policy Unit), and the Co-Investigator on ‘Big data, live methods and surveillance subjectivities among transnational migrants in Hong Kong’ (funded by the British Academy).

Thomas is Honorary Professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Hong Kong. He received his PhD at Oxford University and has taught at The University of Hong Kong for the past thirty five years. His publication includes ‘Parent’s choice: A note on parental value and social class’ in Lau Siu Kai et al (eds), *Indicators of Social Development: Hong Kong 2001* (The Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, the Chinese University of Hong Kong, 2003) and ‘Tolerance and trust: Exploring the ethos of the Hong Kong people’ in Lau Siu Kai et al. (eds), *Indicators of Social Development & Hong Kong 1999* (The Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, CUHK, 2001).
